nless one has very sharp insights, it is rather difficult to decipher the roles of characters in our scriptures. It's been the same with Kaikeyi, the youngest queen of king Dashrath, Lord Rama's father, and the mother of Bharat.

Her popular image is of a jealous woman swayed by whisperings of Manthara, her maidservant. And she contrives to send Lord Rama to exile to put her son on the throne of Ayodhya.

The realistic interpretations of Kaikeyi's actions, however, can be as far from that image as possible. But to find that truth, one has to be ready to dig deep, like veteran theatre director Rajoo Barot is set

to do in his next stage production - Kaikeyi.

For Barot, Kaikeyi is one of the greatest women strategists India's ever had, and the Ramayana can be seen not as a battle between Rama and Ravana, but a war of strate-

mythological play but I got a strong recommendation to read the novel on 'Kaikeyi' penned by Daulat Bhatt" said Barot, which, he claims opened his

mind to a different Kaikeyi, who's been misunthrough the ages.

"Do you think a woman is capable enough to win the war, will be so gullible to get carried away by a servant's (Manthara) tale?" questions Barot.

Kaikeyi will be Barot's next production after 'Kasuk bhali gayelo manas' based on Socrates which premiered in September last year. While Socrates had around 52 artistes on stage, Kaikeyi

will have around 12 artistes.
